The Port Costa-based nonprofit Bull Valley Agricultural Center promotes land stewardship and preservation for agricultural, educational, and recreational uses that respect habitat, connect people with nature, and build community resources.

Founder's Update:

Having started discussions five years ago and after three years of solid effort on behalf of the three partnering organizations-working with county officials, undertaking community engagement, and wrapping up the initial planning and public outreach phase of the endeavor-the Field Semester (TFS), Port Costa Conservation Society (PCCS), and Bull Valley Agricultural Center (BVAC) have signed operating agreements and are poised to make the Field Semester program and school a reality. And this has been no small feat!

In our efforts to gain the trust and support of the sometimes apprehensive Port Costa community, we watched as our series of organized in-home and larger public community meetings (all spanning about two years) morphed over time, transforming from moderate attendance and defensive postures all around, to doubling in size and ending with a standing ovation after presenting the project's full proposal at our last public meeting.



We would be remiss not to mention how hard-won this community support truly was, or how resolutely a few fought to defend their community from what they felt was either a bad fit or an outright assault on it. (All of us had strong feelings about our perspectives on the matter!)

We worked tirelessly to openly address community concerns, and, with time, we were able to win the support and blessings of the majority of the community. Without such indication of support, the signing of operating agreements would never have been possible. And in the process, we have all learned how everyone, whether for or against, are essentially after the same goals: to save Port Costa's natural and historic assets from harm and misuse and to assure it's survival as a place we all love-even if we see the path to these goals differently.

With this garnering of support, we have embarked on the next phase of bringing TFS into being: the initial planning phase for our capital campaign. The order is tall and the path ahead long! But we've been blessed to join with a true pro to help us through it. We are so pleased to announce the newest member of our TFS/BVAC crew, experienced fundraising counsel, Rebekah Truemper, who will help us successfully navigate what lies ahead for this essential phase. TRASH CLEANUP: Volunteers **Needed for the Final Push**

Through a partnership with the Contra Costa Resource Conservation District and subsequent grant from CalRecycle, nearly 120 cubic yards of waste concrete and asphalt (more than a quarter of a million pounds) was removed from the land last summer with the help of local volunteers and contractors. In addition to that, stacks of illegally dumped tires and household waste were gathered from the land and centralized for disposal.

We're now on the cusp of finally removing all of the remaining surface waste that has accumulated over the years!

The final push will happen in two parts: tires and trash. With the help of Civicorps (which among many other amazing programs runs a commercial recycling service that trains young adults for careers in waste management), we'll be recycling as many of our waste tires as possible. Civicorps specializes in recycling unwanted tires and preventing them from ending up in landfills, and we couldn't be more grateful for the help

ON THE LAND: Spring Honey Harvest

Winter rains followed by May's unseasonal deluge brought a wave of green to the watershed. Wild onions with their delicate white flowers dotted the landscape in March and April, and wild birds both annual and seasonal made their visitations all winter long. Now that spring has come and gone and summer is here, we look to our seasonal wetland to change yet again.

During these ebbs and flows, our bees have been working with the greenery, turning pollen and nectar from the wet and verdant conditions into our most recent harvest of springtime honey - 423 pounds all told! Early season willow, mustard, oak, acacia and black locust blossoms (along with other year-round perennials) have lent their subtle character to this batch, giving it a delicate, floral sweetness and a color that is more pale than last year's summer harvests. We'll be monitoring the hives closely as we head into the hottest part of the year, and continue to support them as they toil to bring in this season's rich, savory summer Port Costa wildflower honey.
